County settles case of Oildale grandmother killed in crash with speeding sheriff's deputy

sneetbasetbatem A \$2.5 million settlement has been reached in the wrongful death case of Oildae resident Nancy Garrett, who died in September 2014 when a patrol car driven by then-Kern County sherff's Deputy Nicholas Clerico ran a red light at high speed and crashed into Garrett's vehicle.

crashed into Garrett's vehicle. The agreement, which was finalized in early spring between the county of Kern and attorneys for Garrett's two grown children, was not made public until late Thursday. "This case resulted in five years
